#### **The World Meeting of Families**

#### **PARISH PASTORAL CENTRE**

The Pastoral Centre is really coming into its own and often we stop and think how did we get on without it!

It provides a place where people can come together and chat over a cup of tea. It facilitates adult faith development in Scripture course, prayer groups, talks and presentations.

It reaches out to the community to provide support like the Forget Me Not Café which supports families and individuals facing Dementia and takes place on the last Tuesday of every month. There is Bingo on Sunday nights which is becoming popular and we hope in the new year to offer meditation and mindfulness and other initiatives to support positive mental health. # **REFLECTING BACK OVER 40 YEARS**

By the mid 1960s the population in the Fingal area was steadily expanding. This expansion centred in Swords. New families were settling in the hinterlands of Swords Village at a fast rate. Their spiritual, educational and social activities needed to be catered for and an extra parish complex was the obvious answer. So when, in 1972, Fr James J. Alston, then Parish Priest of St Colmcille's, Swords, was able to buy a nine acre site on the Brackenstown Road on behalf of the Archdiocese, there was great rejoicing. This site was to be utilised for building a new church and school.

At this point in time the location of the site was very rural. There were a few houses on the Brackenstown Road, a total of 7 between Knocksedan Cross and Windmill Lands. Brackenstown Road was a narrow rural by-road. There were no streetlights, no footpath, no bus route. Cattle and sheep grazed on the fields where the church and school are now built. The nearest shopping location was in Swords Village.

The territory of the new parish ran from St Columba's Church of Ireland almost to Knocksedan. Fr Finbar McHale was appointed Parish Priest of the new parish. He succeeded in finding a house to rent in St Columba's Heights, right on the eastern perimeter of the designated church and school site. From here he initiated all the preliminary plans and arrangements for the fledgling parish.

The residential estates of Glassmore and St Colmcilles were already up and running. Windmill Lands and Rathbeale estates were following close behind. The development of St Cronan's estate was well advanced. School accommodation for the children of the new parish was now a priority. Temporary accommodation was used at first, until the Junior School moved to its permanent accommodation in October 1974. The Senior School opened in 1975, courtesy of its junior neighbour, where 3 free classrooms were made available to it. By September 1976 the building designed for the Senior School was partially complete.


Meanwhile, the construction of the new Parish Church was moving along steadily. The school served as a parish Mass Centre until December 1977. In December 1977 the new church of St Cronan was blessed and dedicated by Archbishop Ryan. This was a wonderfully joyful occasion. The solemn procession formed up Glassmore Park and approached the church via the pathway behind what is now the BASE building. The Parish Choir provided the main body of the sacred music and the brand new Senior School Choir sang 'Abide with me' as a communion piece. An unforgettable occasion!

While buildings were important, people, both clerical and lay, took priority in the development of the parish. Brackenstown was blessed with its original Parish Priest. Fr McHale was farseeing and energetic.

In 1974 he was joined by his first curate, Fr Denis Henry, and, in 1979, by Fr John Delany. Two new presbyteries, adjacent to the church and on the parish site, were completed in 1977. One became the Parish Priest's residence, while the second was shared by the curates.

Meanwhile, also on the parish site, two vibrant schools were growing. St Cronan's Junior School had reached its planned potential by 1978 as a sixteen teacher school. The neighbouring Senior School, also originally planned as a sixteen teacher school, officially opened in the autumn of 1979. The founding Principal in the Junior School was Ms Siobhan Garvey (now deceased) while the founding Principal in the Senior School was Mr Harry Smyth. Both schools quickly outgrew their planned capacity, and pre-fabricated classrooms were introduced. Every summer holidays, one or two extra 'prefabs' had to be added on. A 'special needs' unit is now well established in the Junior School, necessary additional changes had to be made to accommodate it; some permanent, some temporary, but hopefully these additions will soon be made permanent. Just at the moment plans are well advanced for the re-building and re-construction of the Senior School.

# CHRISTMAS REFLECTION

In the Infant Jesus, the Christmas Word has been proclaimed to you. And that proclaimed Word has three stages: First, the anxious waiting. It is expressed by the lips of a Hebrew prophet, Isaiah: all those endless days when a people walked in darkness, when the land was deeply shadowed, when joy was indeed there but ambiguous and muted, when the experience of God's people stressed a yoke that weighs, a bar across the shoulders, an oppressing rod. But He will come.

Second, the actual coming. It is expressed in the simplest of narratives: a journey and a birth, shepherds watching and angels singing, good news, great joy, to be shared by all. He has come.

Third, the theological reflection. In this child so anxiously awaited, so simply come, in him God's grace has been revealed, salvation has been made possible for all, we are to give up everything that does not lead to God, and wait in hope. He will come again.

Christmas is an invitation for each one of us to discover in ourselves a dimension of goodness, which we call Jesus Christ. It's an invitation to let that dimension shine forth into the darkness of today's world.

Christmas celebrates the fact that the infinite God, at a point in time, crossed an unimaginable border and personally entered our world. The Christmas image of Jesus is that of a light shining in the darkness. Christmas celebrates the fact that when Jesus entered our darkened world hope also entered.

What Jesus was to the world of His time, he wants us to be to the world of our time. We too must be a beam of light in the midst of darkness. We, too, must be a ray of hope in the midst of despair.

Christmas is an invitation for each one of us to be for the world what Jesus was to His world: a beam of light in the midst of darkness, a ray of hope in the midst of despair.

If Jesus is to be born into today's world, it must be through us. We must be the beam of light in the midst of darkness. We must be the ray of hope in the midst of despair.

To the extent that we heed the invitation of Christmas, to that extent will the world receive the gift of Christmas: peace on earth and goodwill toward all.

# CHALKING THE DOOR

We are always invited to make room for God and God's blessing in our homes. Chalking the door is a European tradition, taking place on the Feast of the Epiphany, to remind us of God's presence in our lives.

So you are invited to chalk the following inscription above a doorway in your home:

20 + C + M + B + 17

The letters C M B come from the traditional (9th century) names for the three kings: Caspar, Melchior & Balthazar. They can also represent the phrase "Christus Mansionem Benedicat" which means "May Christ bless this house!"

As you mark the different parts of the inscription you may wish to use the following prayer:

The three Wise Men,

[C] Caspar, [M] Melchior, [B] and Balthasar followed the star of God's Son who became human

[20] two thousand, [17] and seventeen years ago.

[++] May Christ bless our home

[++] and remain with us throughout the new year. Amen.

# PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL

The Parish Pastoral Council is made up of a group of parishioners, who along with Peter, our Parish Pastoral Worker, Fr. Joseph and Fr. Paul work together as partners to further the mission of Christ in Brackenstown.

We meet monthly, our meetings always beginning with and ending in prayer. The first item on our agenda is always Safeguarding of which, thankfully, there have been no issues but we monitor the implementation of both state and diocesan policies as they evolve and change.

The current PPC was formed during Fr. John's tenure as parish priest and one of our first initiatives was organising a parish mission. This took place in March 2013 led by members of the Redemptorist order and was well received and a great success. Under the leadership of Fr. Paul, our annual retreat is now embedded in the parish calendar. Over time we have changed the format slightly to include both clergy and lay speakers and added workshops etc.

In 2013 we organised a Parish Forum and in 2015 a Parish Survey, ideas from which helped us plan for the needs of the parish.

We meet regularly with PPC members from our sister parishes in Swords, River Valley and Drynam and also represent the parish at Deanery meetings and other events in Bishop Field's area.

We are very aware that Brackenstown is now very much a multi cultural parish and we try to ensure that all in our parish are represented and welcomed.

The early part of 2016 was very busy. Our annual retreat, this year led by the Capuchin Franciscans was perhaps our most successful to date. We set about planning the opening of our parish pastoral centre, invited parishioners to a meeting, the ideas from which formed the basis of what proved to be a memorable day in Brackenstown. On Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> June, an army of parishioners, armed with brushes and hoes, Mr. Sheen and Henry the Hoover, had our church and grounds gleaming and the following day as we basked in glorious sunshine, with many of our parishioners in their national dress, colour parties from Brackenstown 164 Scouts and the Order of Malta, we welcomed Archbishop Diarmuid Martin to concelebrate mass and officially open and bless the centre. As many of you gathered for refreshments it quickly became clear that our pastoral centre is more than just bricks and mortar, but a vibrant and welcoming addition to our parish.

One week later, our then Deacon, Br. Martin Bennett celebrated his first mass following his ordination, accompanied by many of his Capuchin brothers.

We are currently working on plans for 2017, which will include a week of guided prayer, our annual retreat and in consultation with parishioners, events to mark the 40<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the opening of our church.

Having served two terms as members of the PPC, 2017 will also see the majority of the present PPC stand down, (or as Fr. Paul puts it, redeploy) and preparations for the formation of a new council will begin early in the New Year. We thank all the parish ministries, Louise, our parish secretary, Peter, Maureen and Georgina our parish pastoral workers, Fr. Joseph and in particular Fr. Paul for all the help, support and encouragement offered to us. We especially thank all of our fellow parishioners for your help, support and prayers over the last number of years and ask that you will continue to do so.

And finally may we take this opportunity to wish each and every one of you a very happy, holy and peaceful Christmas and every blessing in 2017. May God Bless You.

### **Parish Finances**

The Parish Finance Committee would like to thank all parishioners for their ongoing financial support of the Parish. In particular we thank you this year for your support which enabled the Parish to build St Cronan's Parish Pastoral Centre without recourse to any borrowings. The final construction & fit-out cost was €465,530 and the 6<sup>th</sup> and final instalment was paid in December 2016.

In this newsletter we would like to explain how the various collections are used. There is also an explanation of the benefits to the Parish of the CHY tax scheme. Related to this is the introduction of a voluntary envelope system for the First Collection. Brackenstown is one of only two Parishes in Dublin which are piloting this scheme. The envelope system has the potential to substantially increase the amount that is recovered by the Parish by way of the CHY tax refund scheme. It is not an extra collection but just a way of including in the CHY scheme the money that you are already contributing to the First Collection. Thank you if you have already signed up for a box of First Collection envelopes for 2017. The scheme is only of added benefit to the Parish in respect of those parishioners who pay income tax. We invite those who would like to participate in this scheme to return a sign-up form as soon as possible. There are forms available on the tables at the back of the Church.

### **Parish Accounts**

The Dublin Archdiocese has recently moved to using the calendar year as its accounts year. The Parish Statement of Receipts & Payments for 2016 will be available in Spring 2017.

### **Parish Income**

**THE FIRST COLLECTION** at Mass on Sundays and Holy Days together with Christmas and Easter dues are for the support of priests of this parish, priests of poorer parishes and the sick and retired priests of the diocese.

THE SECOND (SHARE) COLLECTION is for the diocesan building fund and diocesan pastoral services.

**THE FAMILY OFFERING** is the main source of income to meet the running costs of the Parish. It pays for the day to day expenses of running the parish as well as maintaining the church buildings. These expenses are in the region of €10,000 per month. Contributions to the Family Offering are either by the weekly envelope collection, bankers' standing order or direct annual contribution

CHY tax refund scheme. If you make a donation of €250 or more in any calendar year, then the Parish can reclaim the tax on your donation. This means that a donation of €250 could be worth an extra €112.32 to the Parish or a donation of €1,000, an extra €449.38 at no cost to you. This applies to donations made through the Family Offering, Christmas and Easter Dues and First Collection envelope. Our Parish has benefited greatly from the tax relief scheme; in 2016 we received €29,765. This is of great practical benefit to the parish, enabling us to carry out some projects that would not be possible otherwise. During 2016 the scheme funded;

- The Pastoral Centre garden landscaping (€9,980)
- The final payment for the Pastoral Centre construction (€9,287)
- The upgrade to the internal & external Church lighting (€5,157)
- The anti-woodworm treatment and kneeler repairs to the church seating (€3,500)

# **First Collection Envelope System**

Some questions that have been asked:

# Q. What if I don't come to Mass in St Cronan's Church every week?

A. That is okay, you can place your envelope in the First Collection the weeks you are here. If you go to Mass elsewhere then you can support the first collection in that Parish in the usual way.

Q. But if I don't contribute here each week then my total for the First Collection for the year won't reach €250.

A. That may not matter either as the total of €250 includes Christmas & Easter dues and Family Offering. For example If someone contributed the following in 2017;

Christmas Dues €50 Easter Dues €50 Family Offering €100

Then their total for the year would be €200 and we cannot reclaim the tax on this. However if we now add in the First Collection for 10 weeks at €5 per week then their total reaches €250 and so we can now claim the tax back.
