- Nominate one of the homeless charities to family and friends that instead of buying something we don't need that a donation is made to them as a gift to us.
- In coffee shops where they operate "pay it forward" buy a coffee and sandwich to be given to someone who comes in from the street or encourage your favourite Coffee Shop to offer this facility.
- Buy a hat, gloves and scarf and give them to someone you see on the streets.
- After Christmas we will again be having the Epiphany Gifts Appeal, to bring extra Christmas Gifts to the crib. This will be the third year to do this and each year TRUST have received the gifts that you bring and Alice really appreciates everything we bring in.
- Take time to pray for those who have found themselves with no alternative but to live on the streets and also to remember their families and the volunteers who go out each night on soup runs.
- Never underestimate the power of wasting time with people, especially
 when they are down on their luck, it could be that time with them that
 makes all the difference in their lives.

A voice cries in the wilderness, "Prepare a way for the Lord", be awake and listen!

2nd Sunday of Advent Year B 7th December 2014 A VOICE CRIES IN THE WILDERNESS...

The role of the prophet is to reflect back to people that all is not right in their lives, that something is missing, that their comfort and peace may be at the cost of injustice to another person. Their voice and their message is to wake us up to the radical nature of the word of God that calls us to change our lives to reflect God's love for all people. It is a word that should not be silent when people on the margins become invisible, when our going about the daily tasks of life, blinkers us. The prophet's call is to wake up, open your eyes, open your heart.

This week the eyes of the whole country have been opened to the situation of the estimated 800 who live on the streets or in poor accommodation in Dublin City. The death of Jonathon Corrie in the tragic circumstance of sleeping in a doorway meters away from Dail Eireann, has made visible the reality homelessness and how people on the streets live and what services are available to them. In the strange sequence of events only two weeks ago he had been interviewed about his life on the street and how he got there.

His life is so close to any of ours that it is frightening how easy it is that a turn of events can take away the securities and lifestyle that we are used to. He grew up in the Carlow/Kilkenny area. As a child he sang in the Cathedral Choir, attended Kilkenny College, had a job and was the father of two teenage children. His downfall was a drug addiction which gradually took away his job, his home and eventually his family. He moved to Dublin to get away from people he knew. Living on the streets became a pattern for him. He stopped going to hostels out of fear and out of a need for peace and quiet. On the streets he could find his own space.

There have been many voices this week giving their opinions on what should be done. The most honest is that of Alice Leahy, who for over thirty years has run TRUST a drop in center for people who live on the streets, which is based in the basement of the Iveagh Flats. What makes Alice's voice different is that she knows the people. She knew Jonathon, describing him as a soft spoken, intelligent man who fell into addiction. She has see governments, social studies projects and great plans come and go, and in her opinion they miss one thing, they see the problem not the people. She has a lovely phrase, that as a society we have lost the ability to simply "waste time with people". So many of the services are offered on the condition that people will fill in forms and give all their details. She simply asks "where did you sleep last night and what do you need today?"
